We talk about money, budgets, and giving, and we invite our members and friends to prayerfully estimate their support for the church in the coming year. Having these pledges of support allows the church to plan ministry with integrity. This season of stewardship also gives us an opportunity to share with transparency how your church's finances are managed so that you may be confident that your support is well used.

Sacred Choices is our stewardship theme this year because sacred choices are made at every stage of the church's financial program, from your first impulse to give a gift, to your decision to make a pledge and give regularly, to the Church Council's creation of the budget, to the way



we safeguard the funds that are given, to the way each and every dollar is transformed from currency to ministry, to the way reserve funds are used and invested, to the growth of our endowed funds that perpetuate memory and mission into the future. pray and sing praises, to reflect on God's word, to share the sacraments, and to fellowship with friends. On any given Sunday, at least fifty volunteers are behind the scenes giving time and talents to our act of corporate worship. They serve as ushers, greeters, acolytes, liturgists, sound techs, musicians and choir members, communion servers, and more! Our two pastors and staff musicians put about 35 hours of planning into Sunday morning worship each week, and they are assisted by office staff and volunteers who create bulletins and slide shows, straighten the pews, vacuum the chancel, fill the oil candles. Worship is the most visible place where ministry happens and we invest a lot of time, energy, and money in making it happen each week. Our spirits are fed, as the Gospel both confronts and comforts us, as our prayers connect us to one another and to God, and as our fellowship gives us a sense of rootedness and a place of belonging. Every act of worship is a sacred choice to place ourselves in God's presence.

New worship experiences provide newcomers with more opportunities to experience worship. Our monthly Messy Church and weekly Vespers services are two recent worship projects that seek to connect more people with God through new expressions of worship. community as a place of welcome and acceptance. As the name implies, this is a come-as-you-are experience of grace where children can be loud and life can be real. Vespers, on the other hand, is a quiet, contemplative communion service that blends prayer and song and bread and cup with the silence that wants to come at the end of a day. Many can meet God in that silence.

Sacred Choices and Deciding to Grow as a Faithful Steward

Like every other aspect of our life, our faithfulness as stewards is a growing and dynamic thing. We know that Jesus spoke about commitment frequently, and called even his most faithful disciples to grow daily in their walk with God. Our sacred choices about how we commit to our gifts of time, treasure, and talent build upon each previous choice we have made. There are some common decisions we all make through the course of our life with God.

The first sacred choice we make as persons of faith is to confess that everything we have comes from God. This affirmation that God is the source of life, love, vision, talent, meaning, purpose, and even possessions, is the foundation of our Christian life together.

The second sacred choice is recognizing that God wants us to glorify God, to know that we were made for this higher purpose. One important way we glorify God is by being generous stewards of our blessings. Our resources are God's tools! This includes our abilities, our time, and our money.

A very important sacred choice is deciding to give regularly to God's work through the ministries of our church. Making a promise of giving to the church is an expectation of church membership, but more than that, it is an opportunity to serve God and grow our faith.

Seeing one's contributions in relation to other uses of one's money is a tipping point sacred choice for most of us. Consider your giving in comparison to other expenses in your budget. Is your support of God's work through your church giving comparable to an evening out on the town once a month, what you spend on coffee and pastries each week, a car payment each month?

Giving proportionally to one's income is a sacred choice that commits us more fully to life-long stewardship. The scriptures tell us that God wants us to give the "first fruits" of our labor. The Biblical model was the tithe, or 10%, given to God's work. Tithing begins with a commitment to proportional giving.

Finally, many Christians who are approaching retirement or planning for the future decide to make a sacred choice of stewardship by providing ongoing support for God's work after they are gone through wills, estates, and gifts to a foundation or endowment.

So you see, there are many sacred choices that we can make over the course of a lifetime. They don't all relate to money, of course. For many the sacred choice of donating a few hours is even more difficult than giving of our financial resources. May God help you to make your sacred choice in your commitments of faith for 2019.

I give to the church for the same reason I make my bed in the morning and brush my teeth at night. It is just part of how I was raised. Growing up in a parsonage, I was aware at an early age that the pledges people made to our church paid my father's salary and put a roof over our heads. We were taught to appreciate that and to be good stewards of that blessing. In turn, I was also expected to tithe what I had, from my weekly allowance to my birthday gifts. (It's a good thing that a Bobbsey Twin book cost only \$.88, because I could tithe the birthday dollar from my grandparents and still buy a new book.)

As I grew, I learned the deeper meanings of giving to the church. Yes, we feed the hungry, provide disaster relief, and support people in times of need. But giving to the church is really more about who I am than where that money goes. My life has been one of deep faith and countless blessings. I feel God present in my life every day and I am in awe of his work in my life. Giving to the church is simply one way to say thank you for all that I have been given.

Ministry is also happening in a larger denominational context and the past year has seen First Olympia embrace the idea of cooperative ministries with congregations in Tumwater and Lacey. A new church start, funded by the Annual Conference, but housed here at First Olympia, is beginning to meet in the Steamboat Island/West Olympia area. We recently adopted the ongoing ministries of the Evergreen United Methodist Fellowship and will partner closely with St. Andrew's UMC to continue the work of the Evergreen congregation. Joint youth and education ministries have already begun, as well as opportunities for worship, fellowship, and mission between the congregations.

Ministry happens in classrooms, too! Did you know that in the past year there have been at least 15 classes for adult spiritual formation? Did you know that 44% of the worshipping congregation also attends these classes? Our **dynamic discipleship program** is a sign that First Olympia UMC teaches and preaches that God is not done with us yet, that we are all seekers after deeper truths, pilgrims on a journey of becoming more than we are and all God calls us to be. From *Faith Links* to *Living the Questions*, from *Bad Women of the Bible to Movies That Matter*, we are growing in our understanding of what it means to follow Jesus.

Ministry happens with our children and youth, too. Children and youth are a visible and vital part of our church family. Each year we distribute Bibles, train acolytes, celebrate milestones, and welcome families from all backgrounds into relationship with Jesus and our church. There are a dozen middle schoolers who will be confirmed as members of the church this spring. The new cooperative youth ministry is creating new enthusiasm among our teenagers. A new Children's Church has been added to second service at the request of our young families. Family fellowship opportunities are scheduled throughout the year. Outreach

Ministry of pastoral care is happening, too. The Rev. Sandy Ward, who works ¼ time for Tumwater UMC as their pastor, and ¼ time for First Olympia doing visitation ministry, is helping Pastors Peter and Ruth regularly visit in hospitals, homes, and in the church offices with folks who are ill, who need spiritual counsel, who are grieving the loss of a loved one, or dealing with chronic physical and mental health issues, or just need to talk about things of the spirit. Our ministries of pastoral care also are seen in the work of Stephen Ministry and Health Ministries, our grief support group, caregivers support network, and Parkinson's support group. It is a sacred choice to decide to care about people as individuals with unique concerns and needs and to provide time and space for those people to experience the grace of God at work in their lives.

We make a sacred choice to take good care of our building, not only for our own use, but for our neighbors, too. Community use of the church is a special ministry we can share as a large church in a central location. Boy Scout Troop 48 makes extensive use of the building, and we extend hospitality to Sidewalk Ministry in their work to address homelessness in Olympia. Barb's Family and Friends operates out of our kitchen and fellowship hall, continuing their great tradition of holiday feeding ministries to the community. We rejoice to host meetings of United Way, People First, Concerned Clergy of Olympia, PFLAG, and more. Many of these groups could not meet if they had to pay market rental rates, and so we subsidize their activities by allowing the use of the buildings for whatever they can afford. When we are paying the gas and electric bills, we know that it is a ministry that does much more than just keep our parishioners warm. We are warming the community, too!

Missions, Outreach, Fellowship, Nurture... our ministries are diverse, numerous, and always expanding. Ministry happens here when the United Methodist Women meet to discuss issues like immigration and hunger, when Kairos Prison Ministry and Lutheran Refugee Services use the building for training sessions, when Just Housing is a guest at a forum cosponsored by First Olympia and the Concerned Clergy of Olympia, when a new Seventh Day Adventist congregation run by and for Samoan immigrants meets in our chapel, when we bring in Sunday speakers for programs between our services that invite our members to become informed about local and world issues and get involved in making the world a better place. Sharing our building is a sacred choice. The Sunday Light Lunch ministry provides a healthy meal and wonderful fellowship to old-timers and newcomers alike. Our kitchen gets used regularly to

prepare meals for the Salvation Army community dinners. We host programs for Interfaith Works and Faith Action Network that engage our church family and the larger community around issues of justice. We have made it perfectly clear that we are a congregation that welcomes all people into our many and varied ministries as we seek to make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world. Engaging the world in this way is a sacred choice that we celebrate by saying to all who come through the doors of the church, "You are welcome here."

Finally, it is important to note that support of the general operations of the church enable all of the second mile mission efforts we support throughout the year. Our Refugee Ministry, the Local Emergency
Assistance Fund, support for

the local missions like the Overnight Shelter, Camp Quixote, and Habitat for Humanity, as well as generous support for domestic and international disaster relief, all happens because the church is running smoothly. We host programs for Interfaith Works and Faith Action Network that engage our church family and the larger community around issues of justice.

Where Does Ministry Happen at First Church?

Ministry happens everywhere and everyday, in all we do. It happens because we make sacred choices about how we use our time, our talents and our treasure.
